Ministry Update (Pictures on the next page)

- I met with a couple who wanted to become members of our church, found out that they were trusting in their works to save them, and was able to win them to • Christ after meeting with them for a number of weeks!
- · A woman who has been attending TBC for around a year, finally took the step of being baptized and joining the church family. Since we started our deaf ministry, she has also been bringing a young deaf neighbour with her for services.
- We are working on systematically reaching out into our community, beginning with evangelistic 'surveys.' In preparation for that, we broke up into groups and took some time during a Sunday morning service to do the 'surveys,' and really got a better idea of the spiritual condition of some who attend TBC sporadically.
- · We have power! Until last month, if we wanted to do anything at the church that needed power, we had to use a generator. The power grid has finally reached our church, opening many doors of opportunity!
- July 26th is Independence Day in Liberia, and it was a great time of fun and fellowship with our church family!
- It is exciting to be teaching men and women in TBC who are able to teach others also, and a highlight of my year is when I get to take them out to a 'Western' restaurant where they get to order whatever they want (they still order rice!) and we spend several hours brainstorming, planning, and growing together.
- A new college semester has begun, and I continue to be thankful for the opportunity to be a part of training labourers for the harvest!
- · Kyle and Elisabeth Burchwell arrived safely, and we have enjoyed getting to know them, tried to be a help to them, and they have already been a help to us.

- In July we completed our 9th year of life in Liberia, and began our 10th year. Where does the time go!?!
- Thank you to those that remembered our birthdays. Jackie, Levi, Alexis, and Bethany all celebrated birthdays over the past two months.
- Jackie was involved in an accident with our Land Cruiser. Thankfully no one was seriously injured, and we expect to get it back from repairs by the end of this week.
- Emmalyn and Alexis were able to take part in a kindergarten class for a week at a local missionary school, as they were doing some teacher training in preparation for the next semester. Both of them loved 'going to school!'
- We are still praying for God's will to be done with our Child Tax Benefit. We received notification that they have finished processing our application, but we have not yet received word as to the verdict.
- I am 75% done my Master of Education, and I would appreciate prayers as we try to work out details to be able to complete my practicum in Spring of 2026.

Please continue to pray for our outreach program, for safety for our family, for grace and strength in this busy season, for our Child Tax Benefit situation, and for my practicum.

We praise the Lord for His continued work in our lives and in the ministry here in Liberia, and we thank you once again for the part that you have in sending us here and keeping us here!


(1-6) Part of our outreach map, and breaking up into groups of three to practice using our evangelism survey.

Liberian English word - sef: "self" adv., Similar usage to the Standard English "even." Inserted on the end of a negative clause for emphasis. *Da woman na know cooking bisneh. She cyan fis pototo green sef!* (That woman not know cooking business. She can't fix potato green self!) "That woman doesn't know how to cook. She can't even cook potato greens!"
